Lesson 1: Introduction and Orientation

Objective: Meet the students, set the agenda and tone, calibrate knowledge and attitudes, and generate interest and excitement.

1. Introductions

Go around the room, each student (and the instructor) says:

- Name and school
- One personal fact
- Personal connection to Israel, if any (family, travel, etc.)

2. Why study Israel?

• Discussion: Why are we here? Why does the synagogue offer this class?

3. What do we know? What do we hope to learn?

• Distribute handout 1.3, ask students to take two minutes to fill it out and return (can be anonymous)

4. Conceptual map

 Draw a circle on the white board, labeled "Israel." Ask students for free associations: What comes to mind? Brainstorm and list attributes, grouped or connected as appropriate.

5. Where in the world?

- Distribute blank map (1.5a), ask students to fill in as many country names as they can
- Go over the map together, complete all country names (1.5b)
- Give a perspective of scale: How large is Israel?

6. Interactive Quiz




7. Outline and timeline


